PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

This my second message as the President of the Canadian Society of Soil Science. Every member of your council is working very hard to make sure that we have a strong and growing society. To encourage our membership, Council passed a motion to create a new membership category for post doctoral fellows. They will pay now 50% of the regular membership, for the term they maintain their position in their respective institutions. We are very pleased with Dr. Steve Sheppard as business manager and we thank him for the superb job he does. We are still far away from our ideal membership and a lot needs to be done in the future. I am obliged to mention my sincere appreciation for the hard work of Craig Drury, Denis Angers, Frank Larney, and our student representative Vimy Glass. Of course without Marie-Josée Garand, our Treasurer, we cannot run our business. It is great to working with you all.

As you know I acted as Editor for the Canadian Journal of Soil Science during Régis' illness. Régis asked me to act as Editor for his papers. He used to pump in about 10 papers a year, to prevent a conflict of interest I continued to help Régis as a 'shadow editor'. This is to inform you that we smoothly solved the problem. It is my pleasure to announce that Dr. Martin Carter, our Past President, is now our new CJSS Editor for a three year term. Martin is very capable and experienced and I am convinced that our journal will grow in his expert hands. I encourage all of you to please support the CJSS by sending your paper to our journal. We also need to promote the journal internationally. We hope that we will be able to have Associate Editors from outside of our borders, as our members serve in other countries. CJSS is very important for the survival of soil science in Canada.

We are in the process of expanding the size of our Awards Committee to develop guidelines for each award category. Our sincere thanks go to our former Presidents Eric Beauchamp, John Dormaar, and Gerald Coen for their efforts. Ed Gregorich, President-Elect and I hope to have more objective guidelines to nominate our students and regular members for various award categories. Last year I had tremendous pressure when we were trying to make our decisions. I felt obliged that we should have better guidelines and a rather larger Committee when making decisions.

Preparation for our joint meeting (CSSS 2003) with the Canadian Society of Agronomy and the International Conference on Mycorrhiza (ICOM4) in Montréal in August 10-15, 2003 is going very well. Please see their website (www.congresbcu.com/icom4) and note the approaching deadline for Abstract submission (April 1). Following the discussions in Indianapolis with SSSA officials Council agreed that we will join the SSSA annual meeting in Seattle in 2004. We are also considering that we may join Plant Canada meeting in the year 2005 in Edmonton. Our contact with many other closer societies is going very well. Recently the Polish Society of Soil Science has expressed the desire for closer ties and cooperation with us. I think these are very positive signs. As member of the IUSS Council and International Association for the Study of Clays, I will be busy this summer and will inform you about any developments. As you know IUSS is going through structural changes and I am glad that I represent you on both these important councils.

Although we are all moved by the departure of our colleague and great friend Régis Simard, we were all quite happy to hear that he received the Canadian Society of Soil Science FEL-LOW award in 2002. Dear Régis, your legacy will remain in our heart, your efforts and contribution to soil science and our society will remain for ever.

In Memoriam

Rodney Colin McKenzie

Rodney Colin McKenzie, scientist, farmer, teacher and idealist who lived by quiet example and outspoken words, died on September 27, 2002 in a Calgary hospital after a seven-month long battle with cancer. He was 69. Colin leaves behind a loving and grieving family: Johanna, his wife and best friend of 34 years, daughter Paula, sons Greg and Glenn and his elder brother, Ron. The son of John Hector and Anna Woode McKenzie, Colin was born in Saskatoon on February 7, 1933.

He grew up on a farm near Hanley, Saskatchewan and was educated in a singleroom country school where his mother was the teacher. Later he attended Nutana Collegiate in Saskatoon. As a young man, Colin spent summers on geological surveys canoeing and portageing the waterways of northern Saskatchewan. He graduated from the University of Saskatchewan with a Bachelors of Arts and Science. After stints as high school teacher in Barrhead, Whitecourt and Blackie, he completed his Masters and Ph.D in Soil Science at the University of Alberta.

In 1973, Colin joined the Alberta government as an agrologist in Brooks. Over the next three decades, his field and laboratory research on soils, water and salinity attracted local and international respect. Farmers often called him to exchange ideas and seek advice. Colin's desire to help others also took him to the underdeveloped world. He spent years working for CIDA and other organizations in Lesotho, Zambia, Egypt and Bangladesh where he taught and carried out research. Colin devoted his life to the pursuit of truth, no matter where it led him.

Sustainable agriculture conservation practises were increasingly important to him in recent years. He warned forcefully of the negative agricultural, health and environmental consequences of the intensive livestock industry, citing extensive scientific studies including his own. This despite disapproval from some government administrators who imposed, but eventually rescinded, a speaking ban on the subject. He retired on June 13, 2002. For much his career, Colin continued to work on his farm near Brooks and he managed another one in Saskatchewan.

He cherished and supported his family in a way rarely expressed in words. Whether it was cheering on his daughter competing at the Salt Lake City Olympics, or visiting his sons in Houston and Africa, he was always interested and involved. Colin's work and family consumed most of his time and energy. Yet he was active in the Rotary Club and the United Church. He was an avid reader and nature lover who enjoyed cross-country skiing and summer walks. Bird watching in his back yard provided him comfort during his final weeks, despite great pain. Rafting the Arctic with Johanna two summers ago was the fulfilment of lifelong dream.

With a dry wit and keen observation skills, Colin would entertain his family with hilarious Christmas skits, impressions of the Scottish Highland fling and unique commentary that left those around him gasping with laughter or just shaking their heads. "I always wanted to sing very badly. And I do," was his favorite way to explain his lack of vocal talent. It didn't stop him from trying. Colin's twinkling eyes, his improvised jokes, his integrity, his analytical mind and sympathetic view of the world will be sorely missed. So too will his devotion as a father, husband and friend.

Martin holds degrees in Agriculture and Soil Science from the University of Alberta and obtained a Ph.D. in Soil Science from the University of Saskatchewan. He has held agricultural research positions with Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada and is currently a Research Scientist at the AAFC Research Centre, Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island. Martin serves as Past-President of the CSSS. He has edited or co-edited several books, including Soil Sampling and Methods of Analysis (CRC Press 1993) and Soil & Environmental Science Dictionary (CRC Press 2001) for the CSSS. Martin has gained extensive editorial experience with scientific journals serving as Editor-in-Chief for Soil & Tillage Research and Agriculture Ecosystems & Environment.

CSSS Fellow Award

Awarded to CSSS members, of at least 10 years standing, with a distinguished record of accomplishment in Soil Science and service to CSSS. Information on the regulations covering candidate evaluation, nomination procedure, and nomination documentation are given below. Four copies of the nomination must be received by the President-Elect, Chair of the Awards Committee, (below) by **April 15, 2003.**

Nomination Documentation (maximum 8 pages, 2-3 cm margins, 12 pt. type)

- 1. One page introductory letter signed by the nominator and three sponsors including:
- a) Name, address, telephone number, email address of the candidate
- b) Name, address, telephone number, email address of the nominator and three sponsors.
- 2. One page summary by nominator outlining achievements of the nominee.
- 3. Nomination documents:
- a) Personal achievements (e.g., degrees, memberships, service to CSSS)
- b) Professional achievement (e.g., research, teaching, service to Soil Science)
- c) Professional publications (number of books, papers, patents, products, etc.)
- d) A list of the 10 most significant publications, products, achievements, etc.

(PhD candidate, McGill U. Dept. of Geography and Centre for Climate and Global Change Research) He has been awarded a Graduate Scholarship for Study and Research in Germany from the German Academic Exchange Service (DAAD). Nathan will be working at the Max Planck Institute for Terrestrial Microbiology in Marburg under the supervision of Drs. Peter Dunfield and Peter Frenzel. He will examine the effects of commercial peat harvesting and restoration on methanogen and methanotroph microbial communities and their activities in peat sediments from sites in eastern Quebec and north-eastern New Brunswick. This work will compliment his PhD thesis, supervised by Dr. Tim Moore, investigating biogeochemistry and microbial ecology of northern peatlands.
