Congratulations to Dr. R. César Izaurralde

who was recognized as a Fellow of the American Society of Agronomy at the 2005 ASA-CSSA-SSSA International Annual Meetings, Salt Lake City, UT - November 6 – 10, 2005



Dr. Izaurralde, was a familiar CSSS member in Albertan and Canadian soil science circles from 1986 through 1997. He arrived at the University of Alberta in June 1986 to work as a post-doctoral scientist (with Dr. Noorallah Juma and Dr. Bill McGill) to develop innovative methods to counteract soil degradation. In 1990 he became Soil Conservation Chair, reaching the rank of Associate Professor with tenure, before accepting a position in the United States with Pacific Northwest National Laboratory, June 1997. The major foci of his research in Canada were sustainable agriculture, soil organic matter, and ecological modelling.

The citation for his award is quoted below.

César Izaurralde is a Laboratory Fellow in the Joint Global Change Research Institute, a collaboration of the Pacific Northwest National Laboratory and the University of Maryland. He is also an Adjunct Professor in the Department of Geography and an Adjunct Associate Professor in the Department of Natural Resource Sciences and Landscape Architecture at the University of Maryland. Dr. Izaurralde earned his Agronomist Engineer degree from University of Córdoba (Argentina) and his M.Sc. and Ph.D. degrees from Kansas State University. Dr. Izaurralde's research focuses in three areas: 1) sustainable agriculture, 2) climate change impacts on agriculture and water resources and 3) climate change mitigation through soil carbon sequestration and reductions in soil emissions of nitrous oxide. Dr. Izaurralde has been an active member of the American Society of Agronomy and the Soil Science Society of America since 1982. He is also an active member of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the American Geophysical Union, and the American Society for Photogrammetry and Remote Sensing.

Neil Foster Memorial Award

A graduate student fellowship is being established within the Faculty of Forestry at the University of Toronto to honour Neil Foster's memory. We have set an ambitious financial goal to ensure that the award is generated in perpetuity. If we are able to meet our target of \$50,000 in donations we will be able to leverage matching money from the province and the university. With this matching money the value of the award will be tripled, from approximately \$2,000 to \$6,000 in annual award income. The Canadian Forest Service, the Canadian Institute of Forestry – Central Ontario Section, and the Soil Science Society of America – S7 Forest, Range and Wildland Soils Division have provided lead gifts to initiate the award. Society since 1977. He has directed efforts towards development of sustainable soil management strategies for horticultural production systems. He served in various capacities in a number of organisations including journal editing, chairing International working groups, heading sections, and working collaboratively with international scientists, industry groups and students. Newton Lupwayi, Secretary



Newton Lupwayi is a Research Scientist in Soil Microbiology with Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada at Beaverlodge in Alberta. Born in Malawi, he received his BSc (Agricultural Science) from the University of Malawi, MSc (Soil Chemistry and Fertility) from the University of Aberdeen in Scotland, and PhD (Soil Microbiology) from Lincoln University in New Zealand. Before coming to Canada, he had worked at the University of Malawi, and the International Livestock Research Institute in

Ethiopia. Newton came to Canada in 1994 as an NSERC Visiting Scientist at a Canadian Government Laboratory. His current areas of research include evaluating effects of agriculture on soil microbial dynamics (and vice versa), nutrient release from soil organic amendments, biological nitrogen fixation, and use of *Rhizobium* as a plant growth-promoting microorganism in non-legume crops. He has published or co-published 49 peer-reviewed journal articles and three book chapters. He is excited about serving CSSS as Secretary in the next three years.

Sina Adl, Eastern Councillor



Sina Adl is a soil ecologists at Dalhousie University in the Department of Biology. He grew-up between Iran and France, was educated in England, and received his university education at the University of British Columbia (BSc 1991, MSc 1993, PhD 1998). His postdoctoral research brought him back to France and then to the Institute of Ecology at the University of Georgia, USA. He has served on the executive of the Int Soc. Protistologists and in other capacities in several protistology and ecology societies, including organizing conferences, chairing sections, and reviewer. He has authored a book on soil ecol-

ogy and coordinated the revisions of the new classification of eukaryotes. His current research interests are in sustainable pasture management, grazing on mycorrhizae, forest soil calcium, biodiversity-ecosystem productivity.

Dean MacKenzie, Graduate Student Representative

After years of education in environmental sciences (Diploma at Lakeland College, Vermilion, Alberta and B.Sc. at the University of Alberta, Edmonton, Alberta) my interests have focused on soil and native plant interactions with respect to land reclamation in the Athabasca Oil Sands Region (AOSR). I am currently in the final stages of completing my M.Sc. degree in the Department of Renewable Resources at the University of Alberta under the supervision of Dr. Anne Naeth. My research looks at improving reclamation practices in the AOSR by using the LFH layer as a donor soil to assist in natural recovery on overburden piles. This spring I am moving onto a PhD, my work will be looking at effective ways to maximize the establishment of native species from LFH donor soils, specifically investigating both salvage and application procedures that will enhance both soil quality and emergence of native species. I am currently a member of the Canadian Society of Soil Science, Canadian Land Reclamation Association and International Society for Seed Science, all associations combined have helped me get a better understanding of soils and soils impacts on our day to day lifestyle. As the new Graduate Student Representative for the CSSS council I encourage all students to get actively involved with CSSS through e-mail, the CSSS website and coming out to events like this years annual general meeting in Banff. I look forward to meeting many students this year at the annual general meeting.

- **4.** Has the student received a previous travel award from CSSS? (Preference will be given to students who have not previously received a travel award).

CSSS Soil Science for Society Award

This is awarded to a member or non-member who has made a contribution towards promoting soil science to the public. This is a nonmonetary award consisting of a plaque or certificate recognizing the person's contribution. CSSS Awards Committee, must have the following documentation:

- Name, address, telephone number, email address of the candidate.
- One page letter briefly outlining the reasons for the nomination.
- A brief résumé (< 3 pages) of the candidate indicating their contribution(s) to promoting soil science to the public.
- One page letter from each of three individuals supporting the nomination.

All nominations must be submitted as e-mail attachments to Gerry Neilsen, chair of the Awards Committee at neilseng@agr.gc.ca by April 3, 2006. Only the following formats will be accepted: Microsoft Word, Corel WordPerfect, or Adobe PDF.

Approval of this award must be a unanimous decision by the Awards Committee members.

CSSS Honorary Membership Award

This is awarded to non-members who have rendered valuable or special service to soil science. All nominations, which are evaluated by the Awards Committee, must have the following documentation:

- Name, address, telephone number, email address of the candidate.
- One page letter briefly outlining the reasons for the nomination.
- A brief résumé (< 3 pages) of the candidate indicating their service to soil science.
- One page letter from each of three individuals supporting the nomination.

All nominations must be submitted as e-mail

attachments to Gerry Neilsen, chair of the Awards Committee at neilseng@agr.gc.ca by April 3rd, 2006. Only the following formats will be accepted: Microsoft Word, Corel WordPerfect, or Adobe PDF.

Approval of this award must be a unanimous decision by the Awards Committee members.

CSSS Fellow Award

This is awarded to CSSS members with a distinguished record of accomplishment in Soil Science and service to the Society. The regulations covering the nomination procedure and documentation, and evaluation of nominees, are given below.

A. Regulations

- 1. Nominees must be members in good standing at the time of their nomination and must have been a CSSS member of at least a total of 10 (not necessarily continuous) years.
- 2. Up to two CSSS members can be awarded a (maximum of 15 points) Fellowship in any year. Persons wishing to nominate someone who was previously unsuccessful as a nominee may do so by submitting new, original nomination documentation.
- 3. Each nominee must have one nominator and All nominations must be submitted as e-mail three supporting sponsors.
- 4. Members of CSSS Council and the Awards Committee cannot serve as a nominator or sponsor.
- 5. Approval of this award shall be a unanimous decision by the Award Committee mem- Word, Corel WordPerfect, or Adobe PDF. bers.

B. Nomination Documentation (maximum 8 pages, 2-3 cm margins, 12 pt. type)

- 1. A one page introductory letter submitted by the nominator and three sponsors including:
- Name, address, telephone number, email address of the candidate.
- Name, address, telephone number, email address of the nominator and three sponsors.
- One page summary by nominator outlining achievements of the nominee.
- 2. Nomination documents must include:

- Personal achievements (e.g., degrees, memberships, service to CSSS)
- Professional achievement (e.g., research, teaching, service to Soil Science)
- Professional publications (number of books, papers, patents, products, etc.)
- A list of the 10 most significant publications, products, achievements, etc.

C. Nomination Evaluation

Nominations are evaluated by the CSSS Awards Committee. A minimum of 60 points is required to consider the nominee for this award. The criteria for evaluating the nomination is (out of 100 points):

- Personal achievements (maximum of 20 points)
- Professional achievement (maximum of 35
- Professional publications both numbers and impact as indicated by the nominator
- Achievements as shown in sponsors or other letters of support (maximum of 10 points for each of the three letters).
