1. Call to Order: Rich Farrell

- 2. Approval of agenda: Mover Barbara Cade-Menun. Seconder Diane Knight.
- 3. Minutes of 2023 AGM: Lee-Ann Bauman. No errors or omissions were noted. Mover Diane Knight. Seconder Angela Bedard-Haughn.
- 4. Business arising from 2023 minutes:
 - a) Steve Pawluk Scholarship (David Chanasyk)
 - i. David discussed the many great contributions to soil science from Steve Pawluk.
 - ii. There will be an annual scholarship of \$2,000 for students.
 - iii. Donations to the scholarship are invited and tax receipts will be provided.
 - iv. Contact David for more information at chanasyk@ualberta.ca.
 - v. The first scholarship will be awarded this year.
 - b) Soil Sampling and Methods of Analysis (Rich Farrell)
 - i. Last year at the AGM the CSSS membership decided to go open access for the methods book.
 - ii. There are two options for publishing: publish open access via CRC Press or do the work via volunteers and publish through Pressbooks.
 - iii. Rich asked if going open access and the exposure we get is worth the ~\$32,000 CAD cost of publishing through CRC Press? Rich noted that we did discuss a fundraising campaign with the CSSS council yesterday.
 - iv. Discussion: How do people want to proceed with this book, and do we still want to do this?
 - 1. Brandon Heung asked if we have to buy the rights for Pressbooks. Rich said that we could get the copyright for free.
 - 2. Nate Basiliko asked if there was any potential for sponsorship since they rely on reagents and supplies from laboratory companies. Rich stated that we are open to exploring these options.
 - 3. Angela Bedard-Haughn asked what reserves are. Preston said that we have a GIC with Sunova that matures in 2025 that is \$24,000. We could use that. We still need to be cognizant of how much money we spend at one time with the WCSS coming. Angela Bedard-Haughn is in favour of us pursuing it and we can look for funding options because it is a valuable reference.
 - 4. Barbara Cade-Menun thinks the copyrighting at AAFC, and for all federal employees, may be more difficult than last time so we should be cognizant of that in this next round.
 - 5. Rich Farrell noted that regardless of which route we take to publish, one of the first things required will be to make a table of contents.

- 6. **Motion 2024-11**: Motion to move forward with open-access Soil Sampling and Methods of Analysis book through CRC Press with a budget of USD 24,000. Mover Angela Bedard-Haughn. Seconder Barbara Cade-Menun. All in favour.
- c) Anti-racism Task Group Update (Amanda Diochon)
 - i. Amanda noted that we are looking for people to help draft a Code of Conduct.
 - ii. Barbara Cade-Menun is on a committee with the tri-society that is drafting a Code of Conduct and it is very challenging and requires legal knowledge.
- 5. Treasurer's Report: Preston Sorenson
 - a) See Treasurer's Report.
 - b) The market has improved so we have had significant increases over the last year.
 - c) Our investment strategies are staying the same.
 - d) Dalhousie's loan repayment occurred recently so our financial reports do not show this yet.
 - e) We will have some expenses coming up for the 2030 WCSS.
 - f) There were delays in getting the donation by eTransfer option set up but Preston now has access to the accounts and will set this up.
 - g) The Ivarson Trust has been transferred to CSSS.
 - h) Preston will be setting up a separate account for the Pawluk Scholarship fund and then will decide on the investment strategy.
 - i) Preston thanked Catlin Dallaire and Jeremy Kiss for their financial review.
 - j) Motion to accept Preston's report. Moved by Charlotte Norris. Seconded by Derek Mackenzie.
 - k) **Motion 2024-12**: Motion to amend the budget for the year by approximately \$30,000 for the Soil Sampling and Methods of Analysis book. Mover Diane Knight. Seconder Louis Pierre-Comeau. No opposed.
- 6. President's Report: Rich Farrell
 - a) See President's Report.
 - b) The first three-minute thesis competition will be occurring tomorrow for Graduate Students.
 - c) Rich noted that he and the CSSS council are very thankful for everyone who helped and/or who were witnesses for the Senate report Critical Ground: Why Soil is Essential to Canada's Economic, Environmental, Human, and Social Health.
- 7. Report of Committees:
 - a) Awards Committee: Richard Heck
 - i. See Awards Committee Report.
 - ii. Richard thanked the judges for the presentations and posters. We have 45 judges.
 - iii. Richard noted that the Honorary Soil Science Society membership and Soil Science for Society Award have not been awarded for a long time so please think about applying/nominating.
 - iv. No one has applied for the Pedology award; however, the award is for a non-student.

- v. **Motion 2024-13**: Motioned that the Pedology travel award can be awarded to a student if no non-students apply before June 30. Motioned Dan Saurette. Seconded by Angela Bedard-Haughn.
- b) Soil Education Committee: Tom Yates
 - i. See Soil Education Committee Report.
 - ii. The Soil Education Committee is occurring on Wednesday and Tom encouraged that we all attend.
- c) Pedology Committee: Dan Saurette
 - i. See Pedology Committee Report.
 - ii. If anyone would like to become part of the Pedology Committee that would be greatly appreciated. They are thinking of changing the current practice so that we can have rotating chairs and secretaries for a specified term. Dan will talk to CSSS Council to determine how to do this.
- d) Soil Health Committee: Derek MacKenzie
 - i. There was a great turnout at Soil Health Committee today. Approximately 30 people showed up.
 - ii. See Soil Health Committee Report.
 - iii. They would like to have another graduate student on the committee from eastern Canada.
 - iv. Email Derek if you would like to join the committee at mdm7@ualberta.ca.
- e) Communications Committee: Henry Chau
 - i. See Communications Committee Report.
 - ii. Please let Henry know if you have any ideas for getting more information for social media posts.
- f) 24WCSS Committee: Richard Heck
 - i. See 24WCSS Committee Annual Report.
 - ii. Mario Tenuta asked if the MOU from IUSS will be with the 24WCSS not-for-profit (NFP). Richard said that it could be with CSSS or 24WCSS NFP as suggested by legal counsel.
 - iii. Rich noted that setting up a NFP insulates the CSSS from financial risk.
 - iv. Mario asked if the motion for the NFP should be repaid so that we will not have that cut into the profit. Rich noted that there is a 50:50 profit split so the money will ultimately come back to us. The CSSS Council would like to provide the 24WCSS NFP with the money without a loan as an act of goodwill that will show the IUSS that the CSSS supports the 24WCSS. Mario asked if it could be labelled as an expense so that it would be paid back before the split of the profit. Rich noted that the message we are trying to send regarding supporting the 24WCSS is the most important.
 - v. Barbara Cade-Menun noted that it is important for us to consider if we can afford this as a loss.
 - vi. Maria Tenuta asked if the insurance wouldn't just cover any issues if the conference fell through. Rich noted that insurance is difficult to deal with and it is significantly safer for the society if we have an NFP and insurance since insurance may not cover all losses (e.g., in the event the insurance company disputes the claim).
 - vii. Barbara Cade-Menun asked if the cost for the NFP was included in the budget that Preston discussed. Preston noted that this cost is not in the current budget.
 - viii. **Motion 2024-14:** Motioned that the CSSS membership authorizes the CSSS Council to expend funds necessary to cover the legal and administrative costs of

- up to \$10,000 to establish the 'not-for-profit' organization whose primary responsibility will be to realize the 24th World Congress of Soil Science on behalf of the Canadian Society of Soil Science. Moved by Keith Reid. Seconded by Laura Van Eerd. No opposed.
- ix. **Motion 2024-15:** Motion to amend the budget for the potential \$10,000 cost for setting up the 24WCSS NFP. Moved by Angela Bedard-Haughn. Seconded by David Chanasyk. No opposed.
- x. Barbara Cade-Menun asked if we could authorize the CSSS to provide up to a certain amount of the \$50,000 per year since we know that the future can change. Preston noted that we won't be able to project how much we will be spending each year and things won't be spent the same over the period between now and 2030. Rich noted that this motion would give flexibility to the 24WCSS NFP to spend money as needed without as many motions along the way.
- xi. Motion 2024-16: Motion that the CSSS membership authorizes the CSSS Council to progressively lend up to \$50,000, to the 'not-for-profit' organization responsible to realize the 24th World Congress of Soil Science on behalf of the Canadian Society of Soil Science, in the lead-up to the 24th World Congress of Soil Science in July of 2030. Moved by Angela Bedard-Haughn. Seconded by Maryse Bourgault. No opposed.
- 8. CJSS Editor's Report: Anne Naeth
 - a) See CJSS Editor's Report.
 - b) Rich is now a Consulting Editor.
 - c) Asked for colleagues to volunteer as Associate Editors and reviewers.
 - **d)** Anne's term at CJSS ends in December. She would like to continue with another term, if the membership is in favour.

Canadian Society of Soil Science Treasurer's Report for 2023

Submitted by Preston Sorenson, Treasurer

The 2023 financial files were reviewed by CSSS members Catlan Dallaire and Jeremy Kiss. The reviews are very helpful and appreciated – thank you!

2022 In Review

The performance of the financial markets in 2023 improved compared to 2022. Our long-term investments with CIBC Wood Gundy increased by \$38,874.95 Jan 1 2023 to Dec 31 2023. No investment strategy changes were made over the course of the year.

Day to day banking and short-term investments are conducted through Sunova Credit Union which was acquired by ACCESS credit union in July 2022. A short-term GIC matured in June 2023 and monies reinvested in a 24-month term GIC (4.55%) which will mature in June 2025.

Balance Sheet - Table 1

Total assets at December 31 2022 were \$540,467.89 – an increase of \$7,576.15 from December 31, 2022. The increase represents the improved financial market in 2023 compared to 2022.

Income Statement - Table 2

Our long-term investment increase was \$38,874.95. Sunova accounts generated \$1,582.53 from interest. Total 'memberships' received for 2022 was \$8,543.02. Profits from the CSSS annual meeting were not received in 2023. The payback from the 2023 meeting will be realized in 2024. The total payback amount received in April 2024 was \$18,239, after accounting for the \$10,000 loan represents a surplus of \$8,239.00. Remaining revenue is from royalties from Taylor and Francis publications and two historic trust funds.

Expenses reflect the day to day functioning of the society including our contract with Nancy Zubriski our office manager, office expenses, liability insurance for board members, and income tax preparation. We maintain an annual membership with the International Union of Soil Science (IUSS) which is based on membership numbers. We are not charged for student registrations or retired members. Other major expenses were the communication and social media contract cost (ca. \$ 12,000). Remaining expenses were associated with student awards (\$14,750).

Budget for 2023 - Table 3

Our budget for 2024 includes assumes that the planned expenses and investment returns continue as was the case in 2023. An end of year balance for 2024 is projected to be \$547,211, a projected increase of \$6,743.36. This estimate is conservative as the repayment from the CSSS meeting in Truro was not processed into the account for 2023, and will be realized in 2024.

President's Report 2023-24

The society continues to be active and involved in soil science nationally and internationally.

There are 372 active members (324 last year) including 159 students (40 with bundled memberships). There are 135 regular members, 36 Fellows, 19 emeritus and 23 early career members. This is a 15% increase over last year and is the highest that membership has been in more than ten years. A personal thank you to Nancy Zubriski in the business office for her support and prompt responses.

Membership is well represented at the meeting. There are 270 registrants, with significant student representation (45%) and 68 oral presentations and 47 poster presentations by students, which is about 10–15% fewer than last year—but still about 26% (oral presentations) and 80% (poster presentations) more than in 2022. I'd say we are out of our COVD funk now! A special thank you to President-Elect, Richard Heck, for organizing the judging of these presentations and to our judges for being generous with your time.

There will be a first-ever (for CSSS) 3-minute thesis competition at the Grad Student mixer on Tuesday, June 11th.

Plans continue to evolve in preparation for the 24th World Congress of Soil Science to be held in Toronto in 2030. The organizing committee is chaired by Richard Heck and Jacynthe Masse. A big thank you to all members and contributors to these efforts. Please consider becoming involved in the planning for the Congress as we move closer to the date. In January we signed a Destination Booking Agreement with Destination Toronto for the IUSS World Congress of Soil Science in 2030.

The Standing Senate Committee on Agriculture and Forestry released its report on the state of soil health in Canada (*Critical Ground: Why Soil is Essential to Canada's Economic, Human, and Social Health*) on June 7, 2024. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the many members of the CSSS who appeared before the Senate Committee to provide expert information and opinion on the importance of soil to all Canadians. On behalf of the CSSS, I would like to acknowledge and thank Senator Rob Black for his tireless work as a champion of the nation's soils.

Rich attended the 2023 meeting of the *Soil Science Society of America* in St. Louis, MO (October 29–November 1, 2023) and met with the SSSA President (Dr. Michael Thompson) where we had a brief discussion about potential joint initiatives (e.g., joint webinars).

Richard Heck attended the IUSS Centennial Celebration and Congress on May 19–21, 2024 where he represented the CSSS at a meeting organized by *Soil Science Australia* to discuss developing an international accreditation/certification in soil science. Richard will report on this during the AGM.

Work on an open access version of the Canadian System of Soil Classification continues (see report of the Pedology Committee).

The *Canadian Society of Soil Science* has assumed the role of trustee to manage and administer the Karl C. Ivarson Soil Science Scholarship Trust. The first recipient of the scholarship under this agreement was Dillon Muldoon, a PhD candidate at Trent University. Congratulations Dillon!

The *Steve Pawluk Scholarship Trust* has now received enough donations to begin disbursing the scholarship. David Chanasyk will brief the membership at the AGM.

Rich has continued discussions with the CRC Press/Taylor and Francis Group regarding a new edition of the methods book. Options for the new edition will be presented at the AGM so the membership can decide on how to proceed; i.e., (i) traditional print book published by CRC Press; (ii) open access eBook published by CRC Press; or (iii) self-published OA eBook.

Isabelle Royer (President of the Association québécoise de spécialistes en sciences du sol [AQSSS]) contacted Rich about holding a joint CSSS-AQSSS meeting in Montreal in 2027. This will be a topic of discussion at the AGM.

President's Award (Poster Presentations):

During the 2024 CSSS Annual Meeting, at UBC in Vancouver, BC, forty-six (46) students are competing for this award, across three (3) sessions. Seventeen (17) judges have been allocated to evaluate these presentations, with each judge considering about fifteen (15) posters presentations and each poster presentation to be judged by at least five (5) judges.

Soil Education Committee Report 2023-24 CSSS Annual Meetings University of British Columbia

The goal of the Soil Education Committee of the Canadian Society of Soil Science is to enhance science education in Canada at both the post-secondary and K-12 levels. Committee membership is open to all members of the Canadian Society of Soil Science. As part of achieving our goal the committee convenes a soil education session at most CSSS annual meetings.

In 2023 at the CSSS Annual Meetings held in Truro, NS the Soil Education Committee did not convene a session on Soil Education and instead provided a report: Comments and Updates on Soil Science Education in Canada as part of the Special Session: Preparing the Next Generation of Canadian Field Soil Scientists, held on June 28th, 2024.

The Soil Education Committee held its annual lunch meeting on June 27th as part of the CSSS 2023 Annual Meetings. This lunch meeting was well attended and several ideas for future work by the Soil Education Committee was discussed. One idea that was followed up on by a sub-group of the committee was a national survey on soil health education. The objective of this survey was to describe the status of Canadian postsecondary soil science courses and evaluate the understanding and interest among Canadian instructors in soil health. An invitation to complete the survey was sent to members of the CSSS as of May 2023. The results and conclusions from this survey were published in the Canadian Journal of Soil Science Vol 104, Number 2, June 2024. https://doi.org/10.1139/cjss-2024-0002

For the CSSS Annual Meetings 2024 the Soil Education Committee has returned to convening a Soil Education Session which was held on Monday June 10th: Innovative Approaches in Teaching and Learning in Natural Resources Sciences. The Soil Education Committee will also hold its annual working lunch on June 12th.

2024 Soil Health Committee AGM Report

The Soil Health sub-committee of the CSSS was established at the council meeting of 2023. Please accept this document as the 2023-24 Annual Report of the 24WCSS Committee. This represents a synthesis of information provided in detailed reports #2 to #8, submitted to the CSSS Council.


A) Membership of the 24WCSS Committee:

- 1) On the recommendation of the Vice-Chair, Dr. Christine Martineau (NRCan-Canadian Forest Service, Quebec City, Quebec) joined the 24WCSS Committee in July 2023. With the rotation of Dr. Asim Biswas off the CSSS Council, and Dr. Amanda Diochon becoming the Past-President, Dr. Diochon becomes the CSSS Council Liaison to the 24WCSS Committee for 2024. Dr. Biswas has agreed to continue as a member of the Committee. In addition to the Chair (Dr. Richard Heck), the other Committee members remain as Dr. Jacynthe Masse (as Vice-Chair), Daniel Saurette, as well as Drs. David Lobb, Kari Dunfield, Joann Whalen and Louis-Pierre Comeau.
- 2) During its September 2023 meeting, the 24WCSS Committee established the "24WCSS Technical Tours Subcommittee" under the leadership of David Lobb. Louis-Pierre Comeau has also joined.

B) Establishment of an Independent (of CSSS) Not-For-Profit to realise the 24WCSS:

- 1) Based on a review of the 'Legacy' documents regarding the 22WCSS, provided by Dr. Bruce Lascelles and Ms. Christine Berrill of the British Society of Soil Science (In January 2023), the 24WCSS decided to explore the possibility of establishing an independent (from the CSSS) entity to realize the 24WCSS. The main justifications included: reduction of risk to the CSSS, separation of the accounting and other business reporting from the CSSS, as well as a dedicated decision making and administrative structure. In July of 2023, the Chair spoke with Dr. Derek Litchi (U of Calgary), of the Canadian Remote Sensing Society, who is organizing the 2026 International Society of Photogrammetry and Remote Sensing Congress, in Toronto (their Society chose NOT to create a 'Not-For-Profit' (NfP) entity to realize the Congress on behalf of the Society). In September of 2023, the 24WCSS Committee met (virtually) with Dr. Bruce Lascelles (Past-President of BSSS) & Sarah Gary (Executive Officer of BSSS). The focus of the discussion with the BSSS representative, was to learn from their experience in hosting the 22WCSS in Glasgow in 2022, specifically on why the BSSS chose to establish a NfP (two years in advance) to deliver the 22WCSS.
- 2) With the agreement of the CSSS Council, it was decided that a working group (comprised of Richard Heck, Jacynthe Mass and Louis-Pierre Comeau, from the 24WCSS Committee, as well as Rich Farrell, Preston Sorenson and Asim Biswas from the CSSS Council) would meet with Ms. Gillian Tuck Kutarna of Thomson Miller LLP for an initial consultation (at no cost) on the legal and administrative issues related to creating an independent NfP to realize the 24WCSS.

3) During March and April of 2024, the working group (Richard Heck, Jacynthe Masse and Louis-Pierre Comeau, as well as Rich Farrell, Preston Sorenson, Amanda Diochon) engaged (though a one-hour virtual meeting and subsequent email communications with Ms. Kutarna of Thomson Miller LLP. Relevant governance documents (e.g. statutes, by-laws, letters patent) of the IUSS and CSSS, as well as a copy of the final 24WCSS bid document were provided, for reference, to Ms. Kutarna. A major question was whether to establish a 'charity' (which would cost more to set-up and administer) or a 'regular' Not-For-Profit. Ultimately, it was decided that, since the CSSS already has 'charity' status, it could handle any donations made 'in support of the CSSS activities and legacies related to the 24WCSS'. A draft vision of the potential functional relationships are as follows:



- 4) The cost for legal consultation of Thomson Miller LLP totalled \$2478.66 for 4.10 hours of time.
- 5) An overview of the proposal to establish an independent NfP to realize the 24WCSSS will be presented to at the 2024 AGM of the CSSS during its annual meeting in Vancouver in June. At this time two motions will be presented: 1) to authorize the establishment of the 24WCSS NfP, including associated costs (estimated to be between \$5000 and \$1000), and 2) to authorize the CSSS to lend, to the new 24WCSS NFP, up to \$50,000, as required in lead-up to the 2030 event.

C) Pending Agreements:

- 1) As per the IUSS Statutes and By-Laws, an update presentation of planning for the 24WCSS, which will include a revised projected budget (with the help of Venue West, as was done for the bid), will be presented by the Chair during the 2024 IUSS InterCongress Meeting in Nanjing (October). Following 'ratification' by the IUSS Council, an MOU can be signed with the IUSS. In this regard, during the second half of 2024, attention will be given to drafting the MOU, taking into consideration the potential establishment of a 24WCSS NfP. In this regard, the Chair has been articulating with Dr. Edoardo Costantini (President, IUSS).
- 2) Once the MOU with the IUSS is signed, a licencing agreement, for the Metro Toronto Convention Centre, will need to be signed. A draft copy of such a licencing agreement has already been received and

will be refined during the remainder of 2024, again taking into consideration the potential establishment of a 24WCSS NfP.

D) Engaging Partner Contacts:

- 1) During it's November 2023 regular virtual meeting, the whole 24WCSS had the opportunity to meet with Ms. Angela Jefferies (Sales Director, Canada & International Association) with Destination Toronto. Discussion included: moving forward (eventual appointment of 'Conference Service Manager'; opportunities for promotion, signage & branding; considerations regarding visas, such as registering with Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada.
- 2) Mr. Rahul Shah of MTCC left his position at end of September. Ms. Hejira Simm-Donaghey (Senior Account Manager, Metro Toronto Convention Centre), will be the new account manager for the 24WCSS.

E) Stakeholder Articulations:

1) Over the course of this past year, the Chair has articulated with: Mr. Terry Kingsmill, Executive Director of the Science Teachers Association of Ontario in September 2023; Ms. Iris Meck, who is the current Conference Director for the 'Advancing Women in Agriculture Conference' in September 2023; Dr. Amber Anderson (Iowa State University), who is coordinating the 2024 National Soil Judging Contest in December 2023; Ms. Jill Weaver (Director of Partnership, New Acre Project of ALUS) in January 2024; Ms. Meghan MacDougall, Program Director, Conservation, of the Weston Family Foundation in January 2024.

F) Special Technical Session at the 2024 CSSS Annual Meeting:

1) In order to begin engaging colleagues from across Canada on the issue of developing soil tours for the 24WCSS, the Chair, together with David Lobb, Daniel Saurette and Jacynthe Masse as co-convenors, organized a technical session during the 2024 CSSS Annual Meeting, held at UBC in Vancouver, entitled "Soil Tours of Canada - Leveraging our Legacy Sites for the 24WCSS and Beyond":

In-field characterizations of soilscapes, using traditional techniques and emerging technologies, remain fundamental to understanding soil functionality, and the impact of evolving environmental conditions and management practices. We must endeavour to continue evolving our ability to effectively capacitate future generations of soil scientists and practitioners with appropriate field techniques, and to provide opportunities to experience Canadian soilscapes. Following from the 2023 session "Preparing the Next Generation of Canadian Field Soil Scientists", and to support the vision expressed in our bid to host the 24WCSS "All material developed for the tours, as well as audio-visual materials captured during the tours, will be curated, and made available through appropriate platforms (e.g., YouTube, Vimeo), for ongoing education purposes.", this proposed session's descriptor is:

"As part of the CSSS bid to host the 24WCSS, in 2030, it was proposed that we would approach the need to develop congress tours, from the perspective of enhancing our national capacity to provide field training for the next generation of Canadian soil scientists, practitioners and enthusiasts. As a reference, various sites selected and characterized for the regional tours of the 1978 WCSS, have since served for other activities. Over the decades, much effort has also gone into the organization of soil tours across Canada, by various organizations, including universities and colleges, for meeting and field-based courses. This session will provide the opportunity to 'take stock' of field sites across Canada, and to discuss how these can serve as a starting point as we progress towards the 24WCSS and beyond."

2) Direct invitations were sent to representatives of the Pacific Regional Society of Soil Science, the Alberta Soil Science Workshop, SaskSoil, the Manitoba Society of Soil Science, the Ontario Soil and Crop Improvement Association, the Association québécoise de spécialistes en sciences du sol, as well as to Brandon Heung and David Burton (i.e., the new Atlantic soil science association).

3) The session has been scheduled for Monday, June 10th from 10:00 am to 11:30 am:

The team is highly engaged in helping us to grow our journal in a very competitive world.

We gratefully acknowledge all of our peer reviewers and thank them for their valuable contributions to publication of our journal.

Congratulations to our outstanding reviewers for 2023: Dr Jocelyn Lavallee, Environmental Defense Fund, New York; Dr Darshani Kumaragamage, University of Winnipeg, Manitoba; and Dr Martin Chantigny, Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada, Quebec. Thank you to our outgoing Associate Editors: Drs Jean-Philippe Bellenger, University of Sherbrooke, four terms; Asim Biswas, University of Guelph, three terms; Henry Chau, Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada, Lethbridge, one term; Fereidoun Rezanezhad, University of Waterloo, two terms; Mozhgan Sepehri, Shiraz University, one term; and Mohammad Valipour, Metropolitan State University of Denver, two terms. We have greatly benefited from their work and dedication with CJSS.

We have five Associate Editors with terms ending in December 2024, and six with terms ending in December 2025. Let me know if you are interested in joining the Editorial Board as an Associate Editor, or if you know of someone we should consider inviting. I would greatly welcome your participation.

Reviewers for all areas of our research continue to be difficult to procure. If you are interested in being listed as a reviewer for our journal, or if you know someone we should consider for reviews, let me know. As members of the Canadian Society of Soil Science, if we each committed to review at least one paper a year for our journal, we could speed up the review process and enhance the quality of our journal. Let's make this the year we all commit to this.

2. Journal Metrics, Statistics

The journal's two year impact factor remains at 1.7; up from recent years. The five year impact factor is currently 1.8, down slightly from last year at 1.989. Although journal impact factor is just one of many metrics to of importance for a journal, we are happy to see these numbers.

Our current turnaround time to first decision is 52.6 days; up from 46.2 days in 2023 and 44.6 in 2022. I would like to see that increasing trend reversed as turn around time is a major factor for journal submissions so we need to improve on that number to be competitive. Many top journals have much lower turnaround times. We will continue with a larger number of Associate Editors than in previous times to facilitate this goal. Reviewers continue to be difficult to procure and this is the main reason for our high turn around time. Mean number of reviewers requested before getting the required number is currently 7 to 9, although some have been amazingly large.

Our total papers accepted from 2019 to 2023 are 54, 68, 79, 70 and 43, respectively. Our submissions from 2019 to 2023 were 159, 158, 212, 125 and 131 respectively; to date in 2024 they are lower than normal at just over 50. Our current acceptance rate is 42%. Acceptances for 2019 to 2023 were 34, 43, 37, 56 and 33 %, respectively.

Our open access publications have increased considerably. From 26, 44, 47 and 50 % in 2019, 2020, 2021 and 2022, respectively, to 61 in 2023.

Our highest number of publications from 2019 to 2023 by institution are: Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada 93, University of Alberta 50, University of Guelph 26, University of Saskatchewan 25, University of Manitoba 21, McGill University 17, University of Montreal 14, Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs 12, University of British Columbia 11 and University of Winnipeg 10.

Our CJSS article downloads have increased slightly from 2019 to 2023, at 287,818; 283,176; 294,668; 297,937; and 311,915, respectively. Total citations have remained healthy from 3240 in 2019 to 3638 in 2022 and a high of 4249 in 2021.

3. Collections, Reviews

Collections and reviews are of critical importance for a journal as they contribute significantly to improvements in citations and impact factors. CJSS strongly supports collections by offering reduced charges of \$30 per page and \$250 for open access.

We just completed our collection on Conservation Tillage: Effect on Soil Properties and Crop Productivity. Thank you to our Guest Editors: Drs Noura Ziadi, Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada; Jeff Schoenau, University of Saskatchewan; and Tiequan Zhang, Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada.

We recently launched an exciting new collection titled Soils and Disasters: Towards Resilience. Thank you to Dr David Chanasyk, University of Alberta, our Lead Guest Editor. Naturally and anthropogenically caused disasters, including fire, flooding, drought, volcanic eruption, climate change, unmitigated mining, warfare, deforestation, and industrial urban sprawl, can have tremendous impacts on our soils. How we understand and address these impacts is critical to the functioning of our planet. This collection is expected to be a global focus on soils and their resilience to disasters. Papers could focus on various topics relating to soils and disasters, including the role of soils in moderating risks, soil remediation, soil building (Anthroposols), impacts on food security, and nature based climate solutions, to name a few. We welcome your participation, ideas and submissions to make this a great collection.

Future collections are needed and are being recruited, including one on soil bioremediation or remediation, potentially jointly with the Canadian Journal of Microbiology. We are currently seeking authors to commit to reviews on timely topics. Please let me know if you have interest and ideas to discuss for special collections and/or reviews as we should soon be scheduling for the upcoming year.

4. Scope, Articles

With our updated scope we are promoting more international and interdisciplinary content. We are interested in timely topics such as those linking soil with climate change, food security and sustainable development goals.

We are happy to announce that Perspectives, a new section for topics of importance in all facets of the soil science discipline, has been launched. Perspectives articles may focus on a research project or method, a general issue of importance to soil science, historical contexts or future directions. We are interested in hearing from researchers and practitioners across the field of soil science; in different career paths and stages, from early to retired, from academia to industry and government. Through Perspectives, we aim to provide a forum to foster conversations around soil science, its methods, practices and impact, to build the wider soil science community.

Thank you to Dr Melissa Arcand, University of Saskatchewan, for our first Perspectives article: miyo wîcêhtowin "good relations": reckoning with the relationship between Indigenous Peoples and soil science in Canada. We are happy to lead off this new initiative with such a timely and important topic.

Other potential perspectives are being sought and I encourage you to get in touch with me with your ideas and commitments.

5. Photos

Although Canadian Science Publishing is no longer printing issues, we are always looking for good quality photos. These photos can be used as covers and in our social media promotion for collections, for our website and for other marketing assets.

We are continuing to run a graduate student competition for photo submissions. The competition has yielded some very good cover photos in the past. The CSSS provides cash prizes for our winners and they get featured in the journal and the CSSS newsletter. One journal cover a year will be chosen, so winners get a full 12 months of exposure, and \$250. Two additional prizes of \$125 each will be awarded for student photos used for collections and other promotional uses. I look forward to seeing your submissions.

6. Actions For Improving Canadian Journal Of Soil Science

As we have discussed in previous annual reports, we are working to enhance our journal's reputation. To do this we need to attract excellent quality research papers and to attract them we need good journal metrics, particularly turn around time and impact factor. A bit of a circular process, but doable with the help of our Canadian Society of Soil Science members to serve as Associate Editors, reviewers and contributors. It is our home journal and its success is in all of our hands. The following are some ongoing action plans we have for our journal.

Work proactively with Canadian Science Publishing to develop and promote our journal, ensuring it continues to attract and publish world class research and remains a high caliber research publication.

Actively encourage and seek regular manuscripts, short communications, review papers, collections on important and timely topics and perspectives from recognized researchers in their fields, and from anyone with a good soil science article to publish.

Incentivize Canadian Society of Soil Science members to consider the Canadian Journal of Soil Science an important journal for publishing their work.

Promote the journal and its community to graduate students; provide author workshops by Canadian Science Publishing, eliminate page charges for a number of graduate student publications.

Include international associate editors, to raise our international profile.







We are deeply saddened by the passing of Dr. Diana Wall, founder and Scientific Chair of the Global Soil Biodiversity Initiative (GSBI). A staunch champion for soil biodiversity science, Diana founded GSBI as a grassroots organization in 2011 together with Wim van der Putten, Richard Bardgett, Johan Six, and Luca Montanarella to connect scientists and inform policy, education, and the public on soil biodiversity. As the leader of GSBI, Diana prioritized the inclusion of scientists from underrepresented groups, the global South, and early career researchers, and advocated for their access to resources. There are very few scientists who have reached out with the intensity and breadth across their field as she did. Diana Wall placed soil biodiversity on the map.

Diana was tireless in her efforts to build up the GSBI and bring soil biodiversity onto the international policy stage. By 2012 she had secured funding from Colorado State University (CSU), hired an Executive Director, organized an international workshop, was invited to speak at the RIO+20 Convention, and initiated work on the Global Soil Biodiversity Atlas (published in 2016). Over the last decade, Diana encouraged the production of the first Global Soil Biodiversity Assessment (2020), secured GSBI participation in the UN's Convention on Biological Diversity-COP14 and international monitoring efforts such as the Soil Biodiversity Observation Network (SoilBON) and the UN Food and Agriculture Organization's (FAO) Global Soil Biodiversity Observatory (GLOSOB). She spearheaded the creation of the international Global Soil Biodiversity Conferences (Dijon, Nanjing, and Dublin), and during Covid produced 'GSBI Speaks' a series of online webinars to keep the global soil biodiversity community connected.

The 4th Global Soil Biodiversity Conference in 2026 in Victoria, Canada will celebrate both Diana's achievements and her spirit of community and collaboration. We hope you can join us.

The GSBI was formed in 2011 by founders Drs. Richard Bardgett, Luca Montanarella, Johan Six, Wim van der Putten and Diana Wall, with the goal of uniting scientists across disciplines (soil ecology, soil science, biogeochemistry, agroecology, policy) to convey soil biodiversity research to policy and land managers for global sustainability of ecosystem services. The GSBI looks to link science and policy through the application of rapidly expanding knowledge of soil biodiversity. As the first step, the GSBI hosted an open meeting in London, in March 2012, following the Planet Under Pressure Conference. Attendees, from 13 countries (across 5 continents), agreed on the urgency to disseminate current knowledge of soil biodiversity to both policy and land management sectors. From this meeting the GSBI White Paper was produced, describing a global goal for managing soil biodiversity for ecosystem services, and the scientific challenges, including harmonization of methods, required to bring soil biodiversity into policy.

The GSBI has since attended Rio+20 Earth Summit 2012, hosted numerous events, workshops, and webinars, supported the launch of a Soil Biodiversity Observation Network (SoilBON), and contributed to several global policy reports related to soil biodiversity working closely with partners such as the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization (UN-FAO), the Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD), the Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services (IPBES), and the European Commission.

A grassroots scientific collaboration now with nearly 4,000 members from 134 countries, the GSBI was designed to create a global collaboration of scientists, all with the goals of informing the public, promoting this information into environmental policy, and overall creating a platform for the current and future sustainability of soils.
